Saturday Sessions

Saturday, May 26 | 10:00-12:00 & 1:30-3:30

Difficult Conversations: How to Keep the Channels of Communication Open A1 (Morning) / B1 (Afternoon)

Steve (Toumbi) Heynen

Professionals working with children often find themselves having to broach difficult topics with parents. Whether a child has hurt another child, a child has disclosed abuse in the home, or a parent is angry about something that happened to their child while in a professional's care, it can be challenging to keep a conversation on track when the emotional stakes are high.

This presentation will explore key factors affecting the outcomes of difficult conversations between professionals and families. It will draw on principles from attachment theory, communication theory, and evolutionary psychology to articulate the subtle dynamics of these difficult conversations. We will also work on specific skills and language that can help keep a conversation from turning into a conflict.

Participants will come away with a more integrated understanding of what can go wrong and what can go right when they are communicating from a professional position.

The content of this workshop will be at an intermediate level. An understanding of some basic principles of human development (like attachment theory) would be an asset for participants.





Heart and Knowledge

A2 (Morning) / B2 (Afternoon)

Human Early Learning Partnership (HELP) Faculty: Joanne Schroeder & Pippa Rowcliffe

This workshop will offer a renewed approach to working across organizations for early childhood educators, practitioners and managers/programmers, by fostering their own social and emotional learning skills, increasing their understanding of how systems work; and strengthening their knowledge of child development in their community.

HELP has collected data on children's development in the West Kootenays for nearly twenty years. Data from the Early Development Instrument (EDI), along with information from additional data sources, provides a rich understanding of how children are doing throughout this region.

Overall, these data are indicating increasing vulnerabilities in areas of social and emotional development, a trend of concern across many BC communities. These data are an important tool towards creating change for children and yet, to address the many influences that are impacting children's healthy development, data must be used within the context of a new way of working together.

This new way includes explorations across a number of domains:

Ourselves - deepening self-awareness and examining our personal dreams and beliefs
Our relationships - authentic interactions with our colleagues can lead to more effective strategies
Our culture - how do our collective beliefs and assumptions drive what we do
Our structures and tools - Data is one of the things that can be a catalyst for action. What other knowledge and structures can create change.

During the workshop, participants will have the opportunity to explore local and regional EDI trends, learn about and practice new tools and strategies to work together more authentically, bringing compassion, personal reflection and mastery to their work.





How To Be A Mentor Who Inspires & Guides Others

A3 (Morning) / B3(Afternoon)

Selkirk College ECCE Faculty: Aanyta
Fahrenbruch, Taya Whitehead & Ellen Strelaeff

During this workshop participants will be introduced to mentorship as a professional development tool.

The presentation will be highly interactive, encouraging self-reflective practice, emotional intelligence and leadership skills. Participants will be able to gain insight into their own communication style and how to effectively inspire and guide the people they work with.

Be ready to experience new insights into your own work with children and new perspectives which may influence the way you work with others.

The KAIROS Blanket Exercise

A4 (full day)

Circle of Indigenous Nations Society (COINS) & COINS Elders

In this full day, experiential workshop, facilitators will guide participants through the Blanket Exercise, as developed by KAIROS (https://www.kairoscanada.org/what-we-do/indigenous-rights/blanket-exercise). The purpose of this interactive exercise is to learn about the history and impact of colonization through the eyes of Indigenous people in Canada. Facilitators and Elders will guide participants through a traditional talking circle, raising awareness and understanding of the nation to nation relationships between Indigenous and non-indigenous peoples in Canada.



The Blanket Exercise explores the major themes and recommendations of the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples and examines how federal policies and programs impact the lives of the First-Nations peoples and bring about positive change. Maximum 25 participants

The Reggio Approach

A5 (Morning)

Natasha Smith

Based on the Reggio Emilia practices, this workshop will provide you with inspiration and new ideas about how to approach art with young children.

Beginning with an overview of the Reggio Emilia art philosophy and practices, this is a hands-on workshop, where you will be guided through a number of art making techniques and exercises that will inspire and reaffirm the importance of art for young children. Lots of tips and tricks will be included so you can easily incorporate art making into your weekly routines and enrich the experiences of your young children.

Art Material Exploration 101

B5 (Afternoon)

This hands-on workshop will introduce you to various art materials and art techniques while incorporating the Reggio Emilia approach to artmaking. By investigating the basic elements that make an artwork (line, shape, colour and texture) you will explore the qualities and potential of the various art materials.

Through building your confidence and understanding of the materials, you will be able to provide your young students invaluable opportunities for self-expression and guide safe exploration as they develop their visual language.

Walk Like a Crow and Be Open to Wonder

A6 (Morning) / B6 (Afternoon)

Monika Carpendale & Will Parker

Stimulating connection and attachment to nature is a profound way to enhance a sense of belonging and relationship to others. In this experiential workshop we will focus on the use of art and environmental education as a way to enhance communication skills and positive group dynamics.

It will include theory based on environmental education, art therapy; as well as mentalization and practical activities applicable for children ages 2 to 6 years old. The approach includes a sensory focus and activities intended to increase self-regulation.



There will be both structured and unstructured elements to increase perception, listening, imagination, and sensory exploration. This approach is designed to expand an attitude of wonder, encourage emotional development and increase self-awareness in nature. The hands on aspects will demonstrate how connecting with nature can happen inside or outside while highlighting storytelling and exploration of the natural world.

This workshop will combine storytelling, exploration, discovery and leadership skills. A variety of activities will be introduced that can done be both inside and outside. Art making activities will include bringing the outside inside through creative collections. Other activities include: secret gardens, discover colours, walk like a crow and find a face or creature. Developing an attitude of wonder, increasing imagination and creativity will be central to the whole approach.

Steve Heynen (also known locally as Toumbi), has served as the family counsellor at Nelson Community Services for the last five years, and worked as a child and youth outreach counsellor previous to that. Toumbi holds a Masters Degree in counselling psychology and is also a graduate of the Kutenai Art Therapy Institute, here in Nelson.

Joanne Schroeder and Pippa Rowcliffe

Joanne Schroeder and Pippa Rowcliffe are the co-leaders of the emerging Systems Leadership Centre for Children (SLC²) at the Human Early Learning Partnership (HELP). SLC² will be a hub for research, training, coaching, tools and hands on assistance with systems work across many institutional settings that serve children. Ms. Rowcliffe is currently the Deputy Director of HELP and Ms. Schroeder divides her time between her roles as the Executive Director of the Comox Valley Child Development Association and the Senior Policy Fellow at HELP. Between them they bring decades of experience and knowledge of the early child development system across Canada and a passion for making child development research relevant to community practitioners.

Aanyta Fahrenbruch

Aanyta has 37 years experience working in the field of Early Childhood Education. She has taught at Selkirk College for 10 years in the certificate and diploma programs. Her strong interest in the Early Learning Framework has led to her first hand studies of the child care system in New Zealand and her passion for early learning and children is a driving force in her teaching. It is her goal to inspire educators with the same enthusiasm for working with children and families that has guided her work and ignited her career. She sits on the Board for Kootenay Kids Society and the Kootenay Boundary Community Services Cooperative and has worked in provincial and federal programs such as CAPC and CCRR.

Taya Whitehead

Taya has been an instructor at Selkirk College since 2008. She has been working in the child care field for 20 years, 8 of which were spent as the program manager for the West Kootenay Boundary Supported Child Development Program. She has a BA in Child and Youth Care and a Masters in Integrated Studies. She sits on the Board of Directors for the Canadian Child Care Federation and the Board of Kootenay Family Place. Taya is passionate about the field of Early Childhood Education and has used her involvement on different Boards to drive the field forward and inspire positive change.

Ellen Strelaeff

Ellen has been an instructor at Selkirk College for 5 years in both the certificate and diploma programs. She received her first formal post-secondary training in Early Childhood Education and graduated with a Diploma in Human Services from Selkirk College in 1994. COINS staff and Elders will be facilitating the KAIROS Blanket Exercise.
